<b>Course description</b>	The Course offers a first presentation of the historical framework relating to the development of the legal phenomenon in Western Europe between the end of the Ancient World and the Codification Age
<b>Course objectives and expected learning outcomes</b>	The target of the integrative course is to introduce the knowledge of the methodological foundations of the legal disciplines. The legal history module has the main purpose of highlighting the important formative role of historical legal knowledge relating to the medieval and modern period for the purpose of a better understanding of positive law. The student will have to limit himself to demonstrating his knowledge of the basic notions relating to the genesis of the legal systems of civil law and common law and to the characteristics they assume during the Medieval and Modern Age.
